ACHIEVEMENTS IN AFGHANISTAN

RAWCS PROJECT 55/2012-13: Womens' Academic & Cultural Development in the Nangarhar (Kamah District/Jalalabad City) Afghanistan¹.

Over a period of nearly five years, the Rotary Club of Carlton has channelled funds from external sources together with a Rotary District Grant to our club to support our former member, Dr Noor Shah Kamawal, with four components of this project aimed at assisting the Academic and Cultural Development of the women of Afghanistan. They are as follows:

Girls Education Program: Female students 7-10 years of age were the feasibility target group to be educated with the long term objective of enabling them to proceed to higher education and to gain scholarships to study abroad. After one year of operation, the schools established by this project in mosques are continuing with Government support. A number of girls who are graduates of the Rotary High School in Jalalabad are now teaching in those schools. There is a deep interest in providing girls with education, particularly if it is community based. The schools were initially set up outdoors and later in mosques.



Development of a website for the Youth of Afghanistan: This has been an unparalleled success. With money donated from Rotary District 9800 to our club, we were able to have six computers made available to a girls' team and a boys' team to develop a website where young people could ask questions and share their knowledge. A Mullah who was sceptical was won over when he saw the computer laboratories full of young people interacting on the website about questions concerning their culture, their religion, politics, and personal concerns such as equality for women. Youth Workshops for Democracy: These workshops were conducted by Dr Noor Shah Kamawal and his team in Kabul to encourage young people to think about changing their cultural attitudes to create a democratic future where girls would have a better opportunity.

These workshops generated considerable enthusiasm in those who were involved, with continuing ripple effects through their families, friends and contacts and meetings. It is not possible to measure the impact these workshops had on the outcome of the election, but The Wall Street Journal ran an article in April 2014 "Youth Hold Key to Election in Afghanistan" written by Margherita Stancati and Yaraslov Trofimov². After talking with Noor Shah they wrote "This generation is completely different. It is equipped with critical thinking, with innovation," said Noorshah Kamawal, a 33-year old doctor in the eastern city of Jalalabad who recently organised workshops on democratic practices with support from Rotary International. "They are working with previous generations, with their parents, to change their behaviour and attitudes." The result of the election was a tie, with the two candidates working together. This has not been satisfactory. But there is still hope that peace may be achieved with Pakistan which is supporting the Taliban. The influence of these workshops on the young people who attended will not be forgotten.

Workshop on Peace & Conflict Resolution in Kabul: This workshop targeted issues that are so central to the future of Afghanistan and the future of their women. It was an unqualified success, with an attendance of 1,515 people including large numbers of students from schools and Universities, together with senior political leaders from both the Parliament and Presidential Office of Afghanistan. It was a historic gathering which agreed to three significant resolutions. Firstly that similar workshops would be funded by the Government of Afghanistan throughout the country, and secondly, that The Afghan Educational and Research Association should be established to determine the root causes of insecurity and conflict in Afghanistan and to recommend alternate solutions focussed on education, anti-corruption programs and job creation. Thirdly, it was resolved that political leaders and the

community will join together to speak up for the support of the national security forces in other districts of Kabul and throughout the provinces of Afghanistan through social media.
